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Safe Use of Opioids

The Substance Use Disorder Clinical Consensus Workgroup (CCW) of the [Clinical Collaboration Council \(CCC\)](#) is promoting increased awareness of the safe use of opioids.

Did you know that the odds of death from an accidental opioid overdose now exceed that of death from a motor-vehicle crash or trauma? Or, that rates of fatal overdoses are 10 times higher in patients who are co-dispensed opioid analgesics and benzodiazepines versus opioids alone?
